

President's Report


What an incredible year it has been for Uni Camp for Kids.

I couldn't be prouder of how far the charity has come over the past 12 months, and of the incredible dedication and support from our volunteers and sponsors.

From the outset, the executive team set clear goals to guide the year and shape Uni Camp's growth. Our primary focus was on recruiting, retaining, and supporting our volunteers and we made real progress. We secured funding for key initiatives, including fuel reimbursement for Picnic volunteers and Family Day allowances on Camps. This financial support helped break down a major barrier for our university aged volunteers, particularly during the current economic climate.

We also focused on providing volunteers with the opportunity to upskill - introducing subsidised Bronze Medallion courses to build their water safety and resuscitation skills. These qualifications have helped us meet the required safety ratios at pools and calm water venues, ensuring a safe environment for both children and volunteers.

Another major milestone was being selected as one of the Telethon beneficiaries for 2025. This funding fully covered our 2025 Camp excursions and will fund all Picnics through to the end of the year. More than that, it's opened doors to new partnerships with other WA-based community groups, expanding our reach and potential impact.



It was a huge year for sponsorships, as we worked alongside our long-standing supporters including Lotterywest, Making Life Better, Joondalup Ladies Golf Day, and Retravision. Thank you to all our sponsors, both returning and new, who have supported us over the past 12 months. We couldn't have done it without your generosity. Your contributions have directly impacted the lives of hundreds of children, helping us deliver safe, meaningful, and unforgettable experiences through every Camp and Picnic.

Thanks to these efforts and the incredible generosity of our community, we were able to support over 500 children through our programs this year.

I could continue to fill pages with all that Uni Camp has achieved in the past 12 months, but instead, I want to share the heart of our journey this past year.

During my final year of my physiotherapy degree, I stepped into the role of President. Many of my peers and supervisors questioned the timing. Why take on such a big commitment when I should be focused on my clinical placements and impressing future employers? Why pour so much energy into a charity unrelated to my future career?

At first, I'd just shrug it off - it didn't feel worth trying to explain to people who wouldn't understand. But as more and more people questioned my decision, I found myself starting to reflect on that question: why?

Why, in the most intense part of my degree, would I take on the challenge of leading a charity?

Why do we, as a volunteer community, give so much of ourselves to this cause?

In an era when volunteer numbers among 18-25year-olds are at their lowest, why does Uni Camp still have a group of young people who return year after year?

Why give your time to a cause like this?

Is it the magic of each Picnic and Camp - the storylines and activities where even something as simple as digging up a potato from a sandpit becomes a core memory?

Is it the connections we build with every child? Watching five year olds grow into teenagers. Becoming that one positive, consistent role model a child needs. Hearing from former children, now adults, who tell us Uni Camp changed their lives. That it gave them the confidence to pursue university and break out of a cycle that once held them back.

On reflection, I don't think there's just one reason. It's all of this, and more. Each volunteer has their own reason for staying, and that's what makes this Uni Camp for Kids so special.

As I compile this report, I'm overwhelmed with pride. I want to thank the 2024/2025 committee for their unwavering support and hard work in making this year such a success. To the executive team - Emily, Monique, and Will - thank you for backing my wild ideas and helping make Uni Camp bigger and better than ever.

Uni Camp transforms lives, and I hope this Impact Report gives you just a glimpse of the magic we've all been lucky enough to be a part of.

Julia has volunteered with Uni Camp for Kids for five years, holding roles including General Girl (2022), Secretary (2023), and President (2024).

As Secretary, she introduced structured Picnic training modules to support new volunteers and upskill returning ones. As President, she implemented key policies, developed volunteer reimbursement schemes, subsidised Bronze Medallion training, and secured Uni Camp's first Telethon sponsorship. Across her roles, Julia has focused on building a safe, inclusive, and sustainable Uni Camp for all involved.

In 2025, as Immediate Past President, she aims to support the committee and work to strengthen the charity's long-term sustainability. Her goals include exploring an advisory body for Uni Camp and collaborating with alumni to plan the 90th birthday celebration.

Treasurer's Report

It is with great pride that I present this Treasurer's Report, providing a snapshot of the financial year ending 28 February 2025. This was a particularly significant year for our finances, as we set out to rebuild and strengthen our bank accounts post-COVID, diversify our income streams, and reduce volunteer-related expenses - all while managing the pressure of rising costs due to the current economic climate.

We are pleased to report a total income of \$277,600 and total expenses of \$226,000, resulting in a net profit of \$51,600 - more than double last year's net profit. This strong result was made possible through strategic initiatives and the dedication of our committee and volunteers.

<u>Income</u>

A key focus this year was diversifying income sources. Historically reliant on Lotterywest and alumni donations, we made a concerted effort to expand our grant portfolio. Thanks to outstanding efforts made our committee, we secured multiple successful grants, notably becoming a Telethon beneficiary, as well as securing a 3 year sponsorship deal with Retravision.

Donations also saw impressive growth. Our Making Life Better donation increased by 50% compared to last year, and the EOFY donation letters, targeting alumni and affiliated businesses, significantly exceeded previous results.

Fundraising was another standout success this year, with a range of events contributing to our strong financial position. The UCFK Festival was a major highlight. Other successful initiatives included bake sales, sausage sizzles, and the ever-popular Bike Bar event. We engaged in many "Work for Donations," where our members volunteered at various events. And finally, a special mention to some incredible volunteers conducting personal fundraisers; Isy Tomich's Ironman fundraiser and Billy and Annie's wedding gift fund!

Expenses

A major focus this year was reducing volunteer expenses while maintaining financial sustainability. This included removing the pool entry fee for volunteers, introducing fuel gift cards and. We also incurred new costs with our storage shed but successfully negotiated a reduced rate.

On our camps, Point Peron Camp School costs continue to significantly rise, this year totalling \$127,800. However, we continued our volunteer support initiatives by introducing family day reimbursements, giving each family \$100 to spend on the day, to which we received fantastic feedback. We also increased our activites budget to \$700 per camp. We also had some Transport expenses included hiring a minibus in addition to our regular party busses, fuel costs and bus driver licence reimbursements.

Thank you to everyone who played a part in this incredible year!



Emily took on the role of Treasurer after three years of dedication to the charity, and in her second year of a Juris Doctor degree. She brought strong leadership, financial governance, and a passion for supporting both the children and volunteers alike. This year, she led key initiatives, including the EOFY fundraising drive, which raised over \$13,000, and the Family Day Allowance to financially assist volunteers on Camps. Emily also introduced measures to strengthen Uni Camp's long-term financial stability. Looking ahead, she aims to support the 2025 committee by contributing to strategic planning and enhancing the charity's legal systems.



Secretary's Report




In 2024, Uni Camp for Kids achieved significant milestones in its mission to support local children experiencing financial, social, and emotional disadvantages. We were pleased to have nearly 500 children from the Western Australian community participate in our programs. This marked a year of growth and impact, as we received positive feedback about how our initiatives were positively affecting the lives of the children involved.

Between 2024 and 2025, over 100 new children were referred to our programs by Social Workers, Case Managers, and Deputy Principals. Many of these children attended our Picnics in 2024, and participated in their first Camp experience in 2025. The feedback from the children and their carers has been overwhelmingly positive, reflecting the meaningful impact our programs have had on the children's lives.

Our main focus in 2024 and 2025 centered on making our programs more accessible to carers. We made our registration process more accessible for carers by transitioning from penand-paper forms to an electronic registration system. Carers have expressed great appreciation for this change, as it made the process easier by removing the need to visit local libraries for printing, completing, and scanning forms. This new process not only made registration more convenient for carers but also streamlined our internal operations, allowing us to maintain better records and ensure that we could easily reach out to children previously referred to our programs.

We are deeply grateful to our sponsors, whose support made it possible to hold five successful Picnics and two amazing Camps. The first Picnic of 2025, sponsored by Telethon, was our largest since July 2021, supporting nearly 200 children. This event highlights the continued growth of Uni Camp for Kids, 89 years on, as well as the demand for our services within the community. It highlights the positive impact we continue to have on children, families, and carers.



As part of our reflection on the year, we asked a group of the 65 children who graduated from Uni Camp for Kids in 2024/2025 what they would remember most about their experiences. Every child responded with the same sentiment: "The volunteers and the friends they met along the way." This reflects the incredible emotional impact our volunteers have, as they not only build strong relationships with the children we support but also create a safe and nurturing environment where these children can thrive.

Finally, we would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to our volunteers. You are the true role models for these children, and for many of them, Uni Camp for Kids is the highlight of their year. Your dedication, kindness, and commitment make all the difference. Without you, our mission would not be possible. Thank you for helping us continue to provide a safe and supportive environment for children to simply be kids.

After serving as Treasurer in 2023, Monique stepped into the role of Secretary, performing the role with compassion and kindness. She continously ensured all children were accounted for at all our events. She introduced online Picnic sign-up forms, making them more accessible for carers and guardians. In 2025, Monique will begin her third term on the committee as President, aiming to foster a safe, inclusive Uni Camp for everyone.





She is eager to dance on the party bus like her leaders did when she was little and make a difference for children in similar situations to her own. — Carer





Vice President's Report

2024 was a year of tremendous growth for Uni Camp for Kids.

I returned to Uni Camp for Kids in 2022 and experienced the wonder of UCFK's camp programs for the first time, having been a part-time-picnicker in the early years of my undergraduate degree.

At the age of 24, after having one of the best weeks of my life at Point Peron, I sat and listened as a 30-year-old retiring camper had a discussion with the male volunteers at that camp about the state of the charity.

Covid had hurt volunteer numbers hard, particularly amongst the younger male demographic, and we were struggling to find enough new volunteers to run our programs in their traditional formats. That camper stressed how it was on those who had experienced the magic of our programs, to step up and do one small act that may contribute towards the longevity of our charity - whether that was remaining involved as a volunteer, sharing their experiences with their friends, or stepping on to committee. His words galvanised me, at the beginning of my 7th year of study, to join the Uni Camp committee and assist in any manner that I could to ensure that the life changing experiences I had shared alongside disadvantaged Perth children could be passed on to the next generation of volunteers and kids alike. It is conversations like these that have contributed towards the sustained growth in volunteer numbers and retention that is now re-emerging post Covid.

In 2024, Will transitioned into the executive team after serving as the Fundraising Officer in 2023. Alongside his responsibilities at Uni Camp, he was also completing his final year of his Juris Doctor degree and working part-time.

Will's primary objective was to ensure that Uni Camp met all legal requirements to maintain a safe environment for everyone involved. He introduced an official Working with Children's Check register to guarantee the accurate and secure maintenance of all volunteer records.

Looking ahead, Will plans to continue supporting the committee by reviewing the charity's legal systems and establishing connections with local law firms to reinforce these systems.

In 2024, we made volunteers and volunteer retention a focal point of our executive. We introduced new initiatives made possible by our sponsors and sought to give back to our members to reduce the ever-increasing financial hurdles of volunteering.

On our Picnic programs, we had 168 new volunteers join us throughout the year. That number does not include those who signed up for our programs but that we could not place on Picnic due to experienced volunteer numbers. The influx of new volunteer culminated in us ultimately being able to host 66 families at 1st Picnic 2025, our biggest Picnic since 3rd Picnic of 2021. On that Picnic, we had a waitlist of some 50 volunteers. That is a huge achievement.

On our Camp programs, 110 volunteers aged between 18 and 35 gave their time to help run our programs. That demographic spread is an incredible testament to the lasting impact that Uni Camp has upon the lives of those who volunteer with us. Eighty-five percent of those volunteers surveyed **strongly agreed** that Uni Camp gave them an opportunity to positively impact the WA community.

Ultimately, what these numbers indicate is that Uni Camp continues to significantly and positively impact upon the lives of not only those children most disadvantaged within the Perth community, but the volunteers who give up their spare time to make our programs run. We could not have done any of this without you. I feel so privileged to have been able to represent and be part of such a supportive and selfless volunteering community, and feel comfortable knowing that I will be stepping off the 2024 executive with our volunteering base and charity in its best position in years.



Our Volunteer's Perspective



I am now in my ninth year volunteering with UCFK and I feel more grateful after each and every picnic and camp to be part of such a special community. Where to from here?





Summary

In Uni Camp for Kids' 89th year of operation, it is more important than ever for our charity to have clear directions and goals.

In 2024, the Executive Committee set collaborative goals that contributed to the successful 2024/2025 year. These goals have now become standard practice for Uni Camp for Kids.
